OUR PUBLIC SYSTEMS NEED STRONG CENTRALISED

ADMINISTRATIONS TO SAVE THEM FROM PRIVATISATION

The public school systems in Australia have been successful in educating the majority of the children of Australia for a vibrant, egalitarian democracy because:

- 1. They centralised their administration in the nineteenth century to
- 2. Extend material resources over wide geographical areas
- 3. Train, pay and protect teachers and principals and update curricula
- 4. Educate ALL the children and provide opportunities to ALL children

These systems were above all protected from private, religious systems by the withdrawal of State Aid to these parasitic institutions in the years 1880-1964.

Since 1964, with the giving of State Aid to private religious systems, which educate the few in peculiar tenets, at the expense of the majority, our public systems have been denied sufficient resources and decentralised. Teachers and principals are left to fend for themselves under a privatisation model.

The result – glaring inequalities in both our education society.
